PROJECTS & EVENTS AT A GLANCE


South America | Pasifika | Europe | Asia

Each week we offered culturally themed dishes for the kids to try out at home with their parents, whilst also offering fun competitions, recipe ideas, fact sheets, meal planning suggestions, nutritional information, 'Facebook Live Cooking' and an online 'Nutritional Workshop' for parents; proudly partnering once again with Nutritionist Pip Meads from Pure & Simple Nutrition. Families following our dedicated 'Selwyn Kids Cook Monday's' Facebook Page got to discover global recipes and flavours that children not only loved to cook but loved to eat too!

Selwyn Kids Cook Monday was an initiative taken from the US based Monday Campaigns, and one which encourages families to set aside the first night of every week to establish a routine of making healthy food choices by cooking and eating together. According to a study in The Journal of Pediatrics, eating family meals was associated with reduced odds of being overweight or obese, with national surveys reported by the Centre on Addiction suggesting that kids who eat family dinners have better relationships with their parents and a decreased risk of smoking, drinking or using other drugs.

SPN CHILDREN'S DAY 2021



Thousands of whanau descended on Foster Park for our flagship **Children's Day 2021** back in March; an event made all the more special by the fact that it nearly didn't happen!

We managed to pull off our most successful Children's Day to-date – all whilst retaining 95% of our original activities and entertainment - at a time when other events were being cancelled across the whole country due to the uncertainty surrounding COVID Alert Levels.

Postponing our event by one week, we managed to totally reschedule everything from activities and entertainment, advertising material, hire of equipment and ultimately reallocating key roles and responsibilities to dozens of volunteers on the lead up to the days itself.

Lending their hands to rescheduled tasks – be it trailer collections, borrowed gazebos, collection of bread for sausage sizzles – you name it, the staggering success of our event hinged on many contributing factors, not least of all our volunteers being the critical component to success, and ultimately the face of our event!

Our event attracted video coverage from the team at Rata Foundation with their 'Faces of Funding' campaign - showcasing just how far Selwyn Parenting Network has come in the last decade.

The outpouring of love and attendance of thousands of families from across Selwyn - alongside such an abundance of committed volunteers - truly reinforced just how much people want to connect and support one another, and play such a pivotal role in our community event.

SELWYN SAFER FAMILIES

Selwyn Safer Families was born from initial discussions held between Selwyn Police, Family Protection Officers and with support from Violence Free North Canterbury (VFNC). It was established as a sub group of the Selwyn District Council's 'Social Wellbeing Group' following recognition for the need to emulate the VFNC model which brings together a collaboration of agencies who aim to eradicate family harm in the region: supporting children, women, families and community organisations.

With a vision that 'All Selwyn residents' lives are free of family harm' the mission of Selwyn Safer Families is one that has dovetailed well into the outreach to services the Selwyn Parenting Network can provide: influencing positive social change within the community, and through empowering the community to send the message that family harm is unacceptable and that change is possible in the quest to eradicate family harm.

Over the past year Selwyn Parenting Network has played a key role amongst a number of other community organisations - including Aviva, Restorative Justice, Salvation Army, Selwyn Police, Mana Ake and Early Start – to pull together free workshops and resources for the community organisations and service providers working within the region. This has been done in order to shape and influence social change through responding effectively, sensitively and appropriately. We have been instrumental in signposting a number of Selwyn families and individuals towards specialist support and outreach facilities. And whilst we recognise that there is a long way to go with this advocacy, we know that a multi agency approach can really help make a difference in breaking the cycle of family harm.

As a vital parenting signpost / research network we know that we couldn't achieve the success we do without our ever-evolving collaborations which extend across the wider Canterbury community. Firstly we thank the ongoing support of funding from The Rata Foundation, Lotteries NZ, COGS and Faringdon who share our vision within the community. Leading on from this are our collaborations which include:

- Selwyn Safer Families providing critical signposting to families in need of support and working with Selwyn Police and other agencies such as Aviva
- Two Rivers Community Trust supporting their Waitangi Day Picnic and Matariki Events
- Selwyn District Council Working together on common projects, and our most recent involvement with developing a charter towards Collective Impact in Selwyn, ultimately looking at the aspects of Parenting and Mental Health / Wellbeing.
- Selwyn Sports Trust Collaborating on physical wellbeing and family initiatives.
- Pure & Simple Nutrition for our month long 'Selwyn Kids Cook Mondays' campaign each July.
- Informational hubs Building strong meaningful connections and relationships with providers who are experts within their fields such as:
 - Talk Together who offer support social skills groups for children.
 - Real Parents who offer provide free Parenting Courses such as the Incredible Years.
 - On The Spectrum supporting families with children who are on the spectrum.

We have also attracted local community groups such as **Mana Ake**, **Cornerstone Church**, **Rolleston Rotary** and **St John Ambulance** to support our flagship events, and in turn raising their *own* community profiles amongst families, all whilst enticing others to volunteer.

The engagement we have garnered from school groups, students' and the university "future leaders" groups – who are all looking to volunteer their time and gain valuable experience in their community - has also been heartening.

Growth of Digital Platforms: We've witnessed exponential growth in our digital platforms

- In 2011 Facebook was only just beginning its journey, with newsletters emailed to schools
- By 2016 online following was a few hundred | We had built a database of schools /preschools and early learning facilities in order to stretch our reach
- Today we sit with a following of just <3000 online and a monthly *average* reach of >20,000 on Facebook alone with an upward growing trend in website traffic.

In 2011 when our first volunteers came together never did they anticipate the heady heights of success that their embryonic network would reach. They knew they could make an impact, and an impact is definitely what has been made:

Numbers of Volunteers:

- 2011: Volunteers consisted of those individuals who attended the initial parenting course
- 2016: Family members and friends would assist as SPN became more recognised (A dozen)
- 2021: Flagship events require a small army of volunteers! Most recent: 60 on the day alone.

Attendance / Participation at Events :

- Half a dozen or so families enjoyed local connections /family get togethers/ picnics in 2011
- By 2016 we were attracting between 300 600 as word spread amongst families
- This year around 6-8,000* enjoyed our flagship event (*calculations given by Selwyn Police on the day)

RESILIENCE & PURPOSE

We have certainly felt a resilience and prepared state of readiness over the past financial year and have been proactive in navigating our way through the ongoing global pandemic and impacts of COVID19. If there's one thing that these challenging times have almost certainly taught us is that charities, social enterprises, not for profits and volunteers really do become the backbone of our local community, and SPN is proud of the role that it has been able to play.

Considerable planning of approximately 5 months, went into our Family Fun Day in October 2020 – always scheduled for the second Thursday of the Spring School Holidays in October. However, it wasn't meant to be when we were thrust into Level 2 restrictions meaning that all events of over 100 attendees could not go ahead. Despite the disappointment, all of our partnering service providers, community organisation's and businesses (involved on the day) totally understood these circumstances being out of our control, and for our parents, caregivers and families we placed ideas on our digital platforms of how they could enjoy a special cost-effective family day together.

We have been widely recognised as a 'champion for positive change' and an activator/facilitator to making the necessary connections so that parents, caregivers and families can actively engage with supportive agencies and service providers. Selwyn has grown considerably with many new and young families moving into the region.... It is no longer a little rural region....many parts of Selwyn have become bustling suburban hives of activity with new sub communities being shaped and new connections being made. The need to collaborate within our community is one that we have not only made happen, but have done so with pride, as we continue to shape our networks within our growing community. We are excited for the collective impact opportunities that we have ahead of us within Selwyn, including being identified as a potential backbone organisation for these collaborations centred around Parenting and Mental Health / Wellbeing.

"The beauty of our ongoing ability to be flexible, to change and to evolve is hugely down to the devotion and leadership vision of our voluntary committee and team.

This has meant that we have been in a great position to hastily put measures in place and ensure ongoing support and empowerment to families, parents and caregivers despite the constricts of physical distancing and isolation.

This has also been critical during these unprecedented times of uncertainty, where there has been considerable concern for many families, including job losses, migrants being away from their families in other countries (with no ability to travel overseas), and considerable mental health issues including anxiety."

Selwyn Parenting Network is incredibly proud to have a diverse and passionate governing committee of volunteers driving the direction of our charitable organization, along with one part time contracted member of staff managing the day to day operations of funding applications, marketing, events, social media, connections, administration, website and networking.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Key points for the year

- In this uncertain year SPN has maintained our presence in Selwyn and played an active and ongoing role with organisational partners, parents, caregivers and whanau.
- Contractor's fees remained our biggest investment. Donations and sponsorship to us decreased because of us changing events due to covid, however we received an increase in the amount from grants in comparison to last financial year. We thank our funders for this contribution as it allowed us to continue the contact with parents that was especially needed in lockdowns.
- Because of our cash accounting reporting, last year SPN had a \$21,052 loss because the money from the Rata Foundation came in later
 in the year. We finished the current year on \$4746 profit.
- We have a small amount unexpended for the year. It is important to mention that \$2,500 from Selwyn District Council was going to be used for Family Day in October 2020 and consequently for Family Day 2021. Due to Covid restrictions we couldn't go ahead with either of them.
- Children's Day 2021 went ahead, with us moving the date by one week to ensure the event could go ahead after covid restrictions. We got an increase in sponsorship from Farringdon which allowed us to provide extra entertainment for the approximate 8,000 parents, children and family members who attended on the day.
- Last financial year we collaborated with another community organisation Talk Together. We received funding of \$3,000 to support communication and social skills workshops for local families in Selwyn. We are thrilled that we did it again in 2021, and better yet, we increased it by \$1500.
- We closed the financial year with \$19,665 cash in the bank, so in a healthy position to go into 2022 and support the growing population of Selwyn.
